Introduction to the Day

Our re-creation in baptism is an image of the Genesis creation, where the Spirit/wind moved over the waters. Both Mark's gospel and the story in Acts make clear that it is the Spirit's movement that distinguishes Jesus' baptism from John's. The Spirit has come upon us as upon Jesus and the Ephesians, calling us God's beloved children and setting us on Jesus' mission to re-create the world in the image of God's vision of justice and peace.

Epiphany 2021

When you are next in the building, you may notice this sign: 20 + C + M + B + 21 above the doorways. Here's what it means... The letters C M B come from the Latin "Christus Mansionem Benedicat" which means "May Christ bless this dwelling!" It is also ascribed by tradition to be the names for the "three kings" — Caspar, Melchior, & Balthazar. The year (2021) is bookended on either side of the blessing. In between each marking is a little cross that signifies our salvation.


In **January**, the item for the month is **beans** (*dry or canned*) and **rice**. Please be generous in your contributions.

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PROCEEDS

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Authors Stephen Bouman and Ralston Deffenbaugh observe that ten years after they wrote the first edition of this book, immigration is an even more contentious issue in society and the church, and immigrants are much more vulnerable, mistreated, and blamed than ever before. Through stories of crisis and hope, They Are Us helps Christian communities understand themselves and their ministries as part of God's narrative of love and hospitality for the little, the lost, the last, and the least. These stories show there is no greater power to unite our divided, angry, and fearful church and society than the presence of the crucified and risen Christ among us.
